FAMILY RELATIONSHIPS



Unified Framework to Standardize Descriptions

ABUSE CENTERS ON UNWANTED, UNINVITED EXERTION OF POWER AND CONTROL

Physical

hitting, scratching, pushing, pinching, burning, kicking, pulling, poisoning, forced ingestion, biting, choking, weapon use, throwing items

Emotional

name-calling, fault-finding, insults, belittling, emotional withholding, humiliation, yelling, blaming, gaslighting, vilification

Psychological

intimidation, threats targeted at family or friends or self, harming pets, unwarranted accusations, pressure to isolate from friends and family members, or withdrawal from work, stalking

Sexual

coercion, rape, unwanted kissing or touching, or aggression, ignoring feelings about sexual interaction, shaming, forcing reproductive health choices

Financial

overspending and savings, withholding access to money or credit or financial information, identity theft or fraud, creating financial dependency, stealing

Technical

online emotional abuse, harassment or bullying, mobile tracking or stalking, profile impersonation or deception, exploitation or extortion, monitoring the use of the Internet, social media, email, text, and mobile devices

Abuse in the Context of Family Relationships

RELATIONAL SPECIFIERS

Sibling Harm by or between siblings during childhood and into adulthood

**Spouse/
Partner** Harm by or between current or previous romantic partners

Child Harm to a minor child by a parent or custodial caregiver

Elder Harm to an adult who is 60 years or older by a caregiver or trusted person

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Parent Harm to parent(s) or custodial caregivers by a minor child





N=103










In your healthcare setting, do you regularly coordinate care with other providers on behalf of patients who experience traumatic stress?

Healthcare Providers Said...

PRIMARILY FOCUS ON EMOTIONAL AND PHYSICAL ABUSE

Strength

Association of emotional distress (75.36%) and physical injuries (66.7%) as key indicators of parent abuse

Opportunity

Additional research into financial control, sexual abuse reporting, and to identify full spectrum of abuse categories
